A curandera is a female healer who uses traditional medicine, plants, herbs, and spiritualism to treat illness and other ailments. The practice of curanderismo includes a variety of healing techniques, such as limpias (spiritual/energetic body cleansings), temazcals (Mexican sweatlodges), and Dia de los Muertos (healing grief through Day of the Dead). Curanderas have been part of Hispanic communities in New Mexico for centuries.

We sat in the grass on my grandparents' lawn and watched fireworks above the lagoon, and as the sky glittered gold and red and silver and the humid air boomed with the rapture of celebration, my family a chorus of awe. And the fireflies put on a show of their own, and no one I loved had died. How magic it all was. Oh, how we *ooohed*, we *ahhhed*.

I am not sure. But to live against all odds, to walk

through this world instead of crawling because told to crawl? Yes, a dark and powerful magic. When told I would die within months from a tumor, to which one do you think I prayed?
